

Six Nations First Labour Force Survey and What It Means:


Grand River Employment and Training Board of Directors announced the release of the Six Nations Haudenosaunee Labour Force Survey (SNHLFS) Report. Surveys were administered during the month of January and February, 2009 respectively, on and off the territory. It is with great appreciation to Individuals who

completed the survey and congratulated for stepping up and sharing their information for the benefit of the community. For the first time ever, Six Nations of the Grand River Territory has a comprehensive report describing its labour force.

A total of 1,735 responses or 38% of all households responded to the surveyors who traveled house to house during the month of January, 2009 to collect the information. Access to complete the survey was also available on-line. Some of the highlights of the report showed an on reserve unemployment rate of 25.3% compared to Brantford at 7.9% and Ontario at 8% during the same month of January, 2009. It should also be mentioned that the unemployment rate during the Great Depression was 27% for the country in 1933. The employment rate for those living on reserve was 45% compared to Canada and Ontario at 62.3% for the same month.



Education Attainment and


Income Levels

The Six Nations/Haudensaunee Labour Force Survey of January 2009 clearly shows the higher the education, the better the chance of receiving a higher income level.

The graph to the left shows whether it's **Post-secondary** with High School or **Post-secondary** without High School, there is a significant larger portion of that population (68.3% and 60%) which earns more than \$30,000.00 per year. It is almost equal for those that have High School but no Post-secondary.

NOTE: Low income level is considered, by most government agencies, to by earning less than \$30,000 per year for a family with two children

Labour Force Reference Week:

When collecting the data for the Six Nations/Haudenosaunee Labour Force Survey, the team ensured there was a reference period of the week of January 11th to 17th, for which all labour force activity was captured. This is the same reference period for the Labour Force Survey that is used both nationally and locally.

As a result of this, the data collected from the Six Nations Haudenosaunee Labour Force Survey (SNHLFS) can be more accurately compared to the labour force at a national, regional and local level.
