Occupations Projected to be in High-Demand


With an aging population, many occupations projected to be in high demand over the next number of years are in the areas requiring extensive knowledge and/or extensive experience. Management occupations are expected to be in very high demand, in particularly middle management. These are in the areas of Finance Administrators,

Human Resource Managers, Bank & Credit Managers, Sales and Marketing Managers, Engineering Managers, Scientific Research Managers, Health Care Managers, and Managers in Social, Community & Correctional Services.

An analysis of the Canada's 100 Best Jobs article indicates that 29.3% of

the occupations on their list are in the management category. Over half (56.1%) of the occupations fell in the areas of management, education law and social community and government services, business finance and administration occupations.

The occupations studied in this report were areas where there is projected to be more than 1 job available per job seeker. Additional criteria is that all these jobs have salaries of at least \$60,000 and employed at least 5,000 people.

The Occupational categories of: 1) Occupations in arts, culture, recreation and sports; and 2) Sales and service occupations were omitted as they did not meet the criteria for high demand in Canada's Top 100 Jobs.

Table 1 below gives the average salary for the Top Jobs based on each broad occupational category. These figures are provided to give a general 'ball park' figure, use with caution.

What's Not So Hot

Not all is good when it comes to salary. Here are some of Canada's worst jobs based on five-year median wage loss.

- •Telephone Operator (-7%)
- •Although Agriculture Specialists have a very good wage, this occupation has been losing value dropping (-8%)
- •Textile Dyeing/Finishing Operator (-9%)
- •Chemical Products Labourer (-10%)
- •Water Transport Engineer Officer (-10%)
- •Paper Machine Operator (-11%)
- •Protection Worker (-12%) does not include security guards.
- •Fabric Manufacturing Supervisors (-13%)
- •Visual Artist (-19%)
- •Electronics Manufacturing Supervisor (-19%)
