"I decided that I wanted to be able to go into being a medical business clerk in order to help patients. It seemed like a good fit as I knew a lot of medical terminology from my own medical issues as well as my son's medical issues," she says. Heather continued her studies at triOS College in medical administration and graduated in 2009.

Now working part-time in the medical administration field, Heather works in many different departments and there is no such thing as a typical day for her. "Depending on the day of the week, the day can either be very busy or very slow depending on what clinics are running that day," she says. One day she can be in the Burn and Trauma Unit and the next, an in-patient ward. She's responsible for duties such as making sure patient charts include all forms necessary and updating records for patient intakes and discharges. It is also her responsibility to field requests from the nurses and doctors. "Anything they ask," she says.

The most challenging part of Heather's work is keeping current with the computer system and honouring the different procedures of the doctors. "Every doctor will have a different way of doing things," she says.

While her job is highly demanding, it is also extremely rewarding. "I love my job," she says. Through determination and her ability to multi-task, Heather has accomplished her goals of helping patients and working for Hamilton Health Sciences.
